
3.0 Censorship at BПСП, BMПС and BПБ



The postal route between the home and the front was as following; after the letter was posted it was transferred from the local post office to a BПСП (field post sorting point).

A BIICII could have a fixed localisation, e.g. BIICII # 1 to Moscow and BIICII # 2 to Leningrad, or it could follow the front, e.g. BIICII #15 to Donskoy Front and BIICII #28 to Northwestern Front ("Front" is the military organization). There were 43 fronts during the war, and they had a number as id. The BIICII sent the mail to the BIIE (field post base).

A BHE was attached to an Army, e.g. BHE litera BE was 62^{nd} Army. The BHE followed the front, and had a litera made out of one or two letters, as id. The BHE sent the mail to the HHC (field post station).

A IIIIC transferred the letter to the frontline where the soldier was. After the summer 1943, field post number (IIIIH) was used instead for the mail addresses.

A similar mail route was used for mail sent from the front to the home.

The navy had a similar organization, but instead of field post station, it was navel post stations (BMIIO or BMIIC). In October 1942 the naval post station was renamed to field post station with the same numbers.

The field post service was reorganized February 6^{th} , 1943, the field post station was changed to a 5-digit field post number. The censor cancels for B Π C Π and B Π B was made mute (removing the location) in spring 1943 and changed with a 5-digit censor number in the summer of 1943.



Field post station (ППС) 1575, 27.1.1943 (wrong year in cancel) to Kazan, Russian republic, censored at BПОП № 3, 2^{nd} period. ППС 1575 belongs to 364^{th} Infantry Division, 61^{st} Army, at this period participating in the battle of Stalingrad. Usage is August 1942 to February 1943, with 5 numbers in the range 2 to 12.

The usage of BΠΟΠ is unclear, but it is associated to BΠCΠ #26 (Stalingrad Front) as a subordinate exchange point. Censorship from the BΠΟΠ are very rare.



Moscow, Russian republic 26.12.1944 to $\Pi\Pi C$ 3220/C, censored at $B\Pi C\Pi$ #1 (main VPSP) (located in Moscow), 3^{rd} period. The letter has been returned due to wrong field post number (it should have been 5 digits). Red cancels says "RETUREND / not correct showing / number field post / Main VPSP"

Usage is August 1943 to December 1945, with:

5 numbers in the range 01460 to 01492, 9 numbers in the range 10541 to 10570, and 11 numbers in the range 10801 to 10844. Mail to/from soldiers was free of charge.



Leningrad, Russian republic 3.12.1942 to ΠΠC 8539, censored at BΠCΠ #2 (located in Leningrad), 2nd period. The letter has been returned (blue cross and the Cyrillic "B"), without any stated reason, but this field post number does not exists.

Usage is May 1942 to May 1943, with 57 numbers in the two ranges 5 to 127, and 201 to 239.

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 $\Pi\Pi C$ 2039 (Staff North Caucasian Front) 1.11.1942 to Dzhambul oblast, Kazakhstan republic, censored at B $\Pi C\Pi$ #6 (assigned to the North Caucasian Front), 2^{nd} period.

Usage is April 1942 to April 1943, with 11 numbers in the range 352 to 435.



Field post number (ΠΠΗ) #15530, 5.4.1943 to Saratov, Russian republic, censored at BΠCΠ #7 (Kuibyshev), 2nd period. ΠΠΗ 15530 belongs to 586th Fighter Aviation Regiment, at this time located at Pridatcha near Voronezh. It is two different cancel types, usage is May 1942 to July 1943, with 18 numbers in the range 17 to 123.



Tashkent, Uzbekistan republic 14.6.1942 to Moscow, Russian republic, censored at BΠCΠ #9 (Tashkent), 2nd period. Usage is April 1942 to June 1943, with 12 numbers in the range 4 to 174. It is seldom civil mail goes through the BΠCΠ censorship.



Tashkent, Uzbekistan republic 18.8.1944 to $\Pi\PiH$ 81038 (therapeutic field mobile hospital 3561), censored at B Π C Π #9 (Tashkent), 3^{rd} period.

Usage is July 1943 to March 1945, with 3 numbers in the range 02545 to 02573.



Uncancelled, dated 25.4.1943 to Moscow oblast, Russian republic, censored at B Π C Π #10 (Chita), 2nd period. Usage is March to April 1943, with 2 numbers in the range 74 to 88.



Chita, uncanceled, then canceled B Π C Π #10 30.12.1943 to field post number ($\Pi\Pi$ H 36604), censored at B Π C Π #10 (Chita), 3^{rd} period.

Usage is rare, so no period or range has been possible to decide.



Gorky, Russian republic 26.10.1943 to ΠΠΗ 03049 (97th Guard Infantry Division) censored at ΒΠСΠ #13 (Gorky), 2nd period. ΠΠΗ 03049 belongs to 97th Guard Infantry Division under 5th Guard Army.

Usage is July 1942 to October 1943, with 16 numbers in the range 10 to 150.

This postcard documents the location of B Π C Π #13 to Gorky, with the cancelation of both Gorky and B Π C Π #13 on the same date. Such documentation are rare and hard to find, and very important for the research of the locations.



Molotov oblast 13.4.1942 to field post station ($\Pi\Pi$ C) 370, censored at B Π C Π #14 (Karelian Front), 2^{nd} period. $\Pi\Pi$ C 370 belongs to 10^{th} Aviation Technical Division.

It is two different cancel types, usage is April 1942 to March 1943, with 13 numbers in the range 3 to 60. Letter is also canceled at the backside with the date stamp from B Π C Π #14 on the 16.4.42. B Π C Π #14 was formed in October 1941 and moved to the frontline in end of May 1942.



Field post number ($\Pi\Pi$ H) 36250, 28.5.1943 to Sverdlovsk oblast, Russian republic, censored at B Π C Π #15 (Central Front), 2^{nd} period. $\Pi\Pi$ H 36250 belongs to 8^{th} Railway Brigade.

Usage is November 1941 to May 1943, with 27 numbers in the range 5 to 143.

The Don Front was transformed into Central Front on the 15th February 1943, and was renamed 1st Belorussian Front on 20th October 1943.



Molotov, Russian republic, 11.5.1943 to field post number (ΠΠΗ) 28711, censored at BΠCΠ #17 (Yaroslavl), 2nd period. ΠΠΗ 28711 belongs to 699th Fighting Antitank Artillery Regiment, 22nd Army. It is four different cancel types, usage is March 1942 to July 1943, with 24 numbers in the range 5 to 146.



ΠΠC 127 (staff Bryansk Front) 22.9.1941 to Rostav na Don, Russian republic, censored at ΒΠCΠ #16 (Bryansk Front), 1st period. Usage is September 1941 to January 1942, sometimes it is with a handwritten numeral (censor id).

This cancel has been a mystery where it belongs too but based on all the recorded usages shows that it must be BПСП #16 (Bryansk Front). This is new knowledge and not documented in any literature, and one of the few identified censor cancels for

BΠCΠ censorship in the 1st period. This is a very rare censor cancel with a very short period of usage.



ΠΠC 127 (staff Bryansk Front) 12.1.1942 to Rostav na Don, Russian republic, censored at ΒΠCΠ #16 (Bryansk Front), 1st period. Usage is unknown due to difficulties in identifying censor cancel, but due to the high censor id it must be assigned to a ΒΠCΠ.



Chkalov, Russian republic, cancelled at a B Π C Π #18 to B Π C Π #19, censored at B Π C Π #18, 2nd period. Location of B Π C Π #18 is unknown, but it is likely in Chkalov after B Π C Π #19 was transferred to Southern Front. Usage is July 1942 to June 1943, with 13 numbers in the range 4 to 197.

Field post number (ΠΠΗ) 17206 23.4.1943 to Saratov, Russian republic, censored at BΠCΠ #19, 2nd period. ΠΠΗ 17206 belongs to 83rd Separate Infantry Brigade. BΠCΠ #19 was first located in Chkalov, later it was transferred to the Southern Front. It is three different cancel types, usage is April 1942 to April 1943, with 11 numbers in the range 14 to 111.



Field post number (ΠΠΗ) 15236, dated 29.5.1943 to Leningrad, Russian republic, censored at BΠCΠ #21 (Western Front), 2nd period. ΠΠΗ 15236 belongs to 87th Border Regiment (Western Front). It is two different cancel types, usage is June 1942 to April 1943, with 25 numbers in the range 1 to 67.



Kransoyarsk, Russian republic, 10.11.1942 to naval post station 1111 (Baltic Fleet in Leningrad), censored at BΠCΠ #24 (Novosibirsk), 2nd period.

It is two different cancel types, usage is November 1942 to February 1943, with 5 numbers in the range 15 to 171.

Sverdlovsk oblast, Russian republic, 31.5.1943 to field post number 42715 (6th Separate Hydraulic Engineering Company), censored at BΠCΠ #22 (initially Omsk, then moved to Sverdlovsk), 2nd period. It is two different cancel types, usage is April 1942 to May 1943, with 26 numbers in the range 2 to 162.



Field post station ($\Pi\Pi$ C) 1485 (staff Kalinin Front) 15.3.1942 to Chelyabinsk oblast, Russian republic, censored at B Π C Π #23 (Chelyabinsk), 2^{nd} period.

It is two different cancel types, usage is July 1942 to June 1943, with 25 numbers in the range 1 to 86.


The BIICII number and censor id have changed places from the normal standard (48/23 instead of $\frac{23}{48}$).

It is also interesting to note that the layout and form of the cancel is identical to the cancel in Chelyabinsk in the two first periods.



Rostov na Don, Russian republic dated 2.3.1943 to Moscow, Russian republic, censored at B Π C Π #26 (Stalingrad Front), 2^{nd} period.

It is two different cancel types, usage is July 1942 to March 1943, with 18 numbers in the range 11 to 60. Based on own research this cancel was made mute between March and May 1943.



ΠΠC 2026 (staff 24th Army) dated 5.12.1942 to Ryazan, Russian republic, censored at ΒΠCΠ #27 (Ryazan), 2nd period. It is two different cancel types, usage is August 1942 to June 1943, with 8 numbers in the range 2 to 86.



ΠΠC 10 (staff 4th Army) 16.10.1941 to Kalinin oblast, Russian republic, censored at ΒΠСΠ #29 (Southwestern Front), 1st period. Usage is October 1941 to December 1941, with 4 numbers in the range 3 to 49.

This cancel has been a mystery where it belongs too but based on all the recorded usages shows that it must be BΠCΠ #29 (Southwestern Front). This is new knowledge and not documented in any literature, and one of the few identified censor cancels for BΠCΠ censorship in the 1st period. This is a very rare censor cancel with a very short period of usage. Triangular cancel is postage free for soldiers.



BПСП #29 28.2.1945 to Moscow, Russian republic, censored at BПСП #29 (2nd Baltic Front), 3rd period. ППН 30210 assignment is not published. On November 19th 1943, Southwestern Front was renamed to 2nd Baltic Front. Very few of the censor cancels used by the army or navy is identified and known. At this date BПСП #29 was located in the Northwest of Lithuania.

Usage of the BΠCΠ cancel as date cancel and not a transit cancel is rare.



Field post station 548, 26.12.1942 to Moscow censored at BMΠC #1008 (Polarny, Murmansk), 2nd period. Field post station 548 was subordinated to 23rd Strengthen Region (Murmansk Strengthen Region) which was transferred to the Northern Fleet 24.7.1942.

It is two different cancel types, usage April 1942 to March 1943, with 7 numbers in the range 4 to 23.



Naval post station 1008, 20.5.1942 to Murmansk censored at BMIIC #1008 (Polarny, Murmansk), 2nd period. Naval post station 1008 was assigned to the Northern Fleet and was located in Polarny not far away from Murmansk. It is two different cancel types, usage April 1942 to March 1943, with 7 numbers in the range 4 to 23.



Naval post station 1009, 8.6.1942 to Moscow censored at BMIIC #1009 (Archangelsk), 1st period. Naval post station 1009 was assigned to the Northern Fleet and was located in Archangelsk. It is two different cancel types, usage May to December 1942, with 3 numbers in the range 2 to 43.



Naval post station 1141, 25.4.1942 to Gorky censored at BMIIC #1141 (Murmansk), 2nd period. Naval post station 1141 was assigned to the Northern Fleet and was located in Murmansk. The sender's address was naval post station 1008 (Polarny outside Murmansk). Usage April 1942 to October 1942, with 8 numbers in the range 11 to 27.



Naval post station 1148, 3.6.1942 to Kirov oblast, censored at BMIIC #1148 (Solovetsky, Archangelsk), 1st period. Naval post station 1148 was assigned to the Northern Fleet and was located in Solovetsky outside Archangelsk and Belomorsk. Usage February to June 1942, with 2 numbers in the range 49 to 51.



Naval post station 1161, 10.8. 1942 to Borovichi, Leningrad oblast censored at BMΠC #1161 (Molotovsk, Archangelsk), 1st period.

Naval post station 1161 was assigned to the Northern Fleet and was located in Molotovsk outside of Archangelsk. Usage only recorded in August 1942, with the single number 42.



Naval post station 1107, 4.2.1942 to Kazan, Russian republic, censored at naval base Kronstadt, 1st period. Kronstadt is the Red Army Baltic Fleet main base outside Leningrad. Usage is October 1941 to September 1942, often with an additional numeric cancel but not always.



Naval post station 1101, 16.10.1942 to Kalinin oblast, Russian republic censored at ВМПБ КБФ (Kronstadt, Leningrad), 2nd period. КБФ stands for Red Army Baltic Fleet (Краснознамённый Балти́йский фло́т) It is two different types (letters КБФ or Б), usage May to October 1942 for the КБФ variant, with 3 numbers in the range 2 to 12. In October 1942 the letters K and Ф was removed from the cancel.
